Your OTA Community Action team continues to highlight all that is best about Oneida and its teachers. For all of these reasons – and more – I am grateful to you.

TALES FROM THE CRYPT

The members of the Oneida Retired Educators Association remind you that we are alive and well and still active on the educational scene in Oneida. With over 160 members, we continue to be interested in the education of our children, the situations, rights and benefits of current and retired educators, and the state and federal legislation that affects us all.

During the recent partial government shutdown (hopefully we aren't in another one as this is read!), some people wondered why there wasn't more of an outcry by workers. The answer was given that we are not living in a strong organized labor era. OTA and OREA members are painfully aware of this, and must continue to resist and repel efforts to erode the strong union we have built over the past 40 years. It's interesting to see what is happening locally on the union front outside of the teaching realm. Paul Thomas, friend of many OREA members and husband of one, shares this story with us:

"I was brought up in a family where my father was a union worker. I became a union worker at a creamery during college year summers (AFL/CIO Milk Wagon Drivers Union). My professional career was outside the realm of unionization. In retirement, I took a job at one of the large box stores. During the "on-boarding" process, we were advised that the company was non-union. We were instructed that if anyone approached us about organizing a union, we were to report that to management. Of course, the words that ran through my head at that were something along the line of "no way in hell would I report that" (I'm sure those weren't the exact words, but you get my drift.)

In the three and one half years that I worked for the big box store, I watched as corporate management continually took away from employees. Perks and incentive bonuses routinely disappeared. The company has since dissolved the positions of department managers, thus eroding the wage scale and people's self-worth.

People need to understand that without the unionization of workers we would be a country of one percent very rich and very little or no middle class. Solidarity, brothers and sisters!"

Thanks to Paul for this glimpse at union suppression that many of us never see. As you continue to meet the trials and tribulations of your day-to-day efforts in the admirable profession of preparing the future of us all, it would be good to remember Paul's advice...Solidarity! Thank you for all you do.
