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Spring has arrived

Many thanks go out to each as they have dedicated many years and countless hours to the youth of Oneida and the betterment of the District. We wish them the very best in retirement...Relax and enjoy!

This year's state budget promises to fully fund foundation aid to all districts. A large sector of the OCSD budget is funded by foundation aid. After many years of budgets that fell short of expectations this is a change that is welcomed. In addition to fully funding the foundation aid, the state budget is also promising a minimum 3% increase in foundation aid to all districts in New York State. Other changes to the state budget include some reforms to the Tier 5 and 6 pension plans. It reduces the vested period from 10 years to 5 years. While this change is considered small to some it is a step in the right direction to keep and attract new people into our profession. I envision that more changes will need to be made to encourage and keep talented professionals in this extremely tight labor market.

While it is encouraging that Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York Legislature are more understanding and are attempting to address the needs of education within the state, it should not be taken for granted that the local school budget will be approved. It takes the voters - supporters like us to ensure that it does. Please make time to vote for your local school budget on Tuesday, May 17th.

TALES FROM THE CRYPT Spring Edition

In the last edition, we reiterated the importance of Tim McElheran in the unionization of the Oneida Teachers Association. Last month we lost Barry Zebley, the man who carried on the work Tim began and became an OTA and then OREA icon. I asked Rich MacAlpine, a colleague and close friend of Barry's, to tell the important story of Barry Zebley. Thank you, Rich, for the tale. (P. Albaugh, 2007 Retiree)

August of 1968: I had just signed a contract to teach Social Studies at Oneida High School. I was given a tour of the building and in the process met many of the teachers who were there preparing for the upcoming school year. I was twentytwo at the time and they were all gray-haired and a LOT older then me. Then I was shown the Social Studies workroom up on the second floor and in there was a young guy about my age making transparencies. That was how I met Barry Zebley and it was the start of a 54-year friendship. We taught together for

33 years until my retirement in 2001; he retired two years later. What was an aging faculty in the late 1960s became a young faculty in the 1970s and then an aging faculty again until we all retired in the early 2000s.

Barry was head of the Social Studies Department for over twenty-five years. As such, he ran a tight ship. He was a great organizer and a fierce advocate for the members of his department. He insisted on having a major role in the selection of new Social Studies teachers. More significantly, he was the President of the Oneida Teachers Association at a critical time in its development. The year before I started teaching in Oneida, the Board gave teachers a \$50 raise and a member of the Association actually wrote a thank you letter to the Board. The process of turning the OTA from an "association" into a UNION began with President Tim McElheran in the high-inflation years of the late 1970s. When Tim McElheran left the district around 1980, Jim Gleason took over as President and named Barry as his Vice President. When Gleason retired in 1982, Barry moved up to President.

Barry took what Tim started and further strengthened the organization during the eighteen years he served as President (1982-2000). He was a key part of a tough negotiating team when it came to contract time. For years, Tony Burnett played "bad cop" and Barry played "good cop": a successful combination that gained concessions from Board negotiators. Twice in his time as President, the OTA membership was prepared to call a strike. Both times that caused the Board to yield on important issues at the last minute. Although during those times, Barry had an adversarial relationship with the Board and the Superintendent, he earned their respect. Former Superintendent Rick Volp recently wrote: "When I think of Barry Zebley, the words Leadership and Honesty come to mind first. During my seventeen years in the Oneida administration, I worked closely with Barry. He always sported three hats simultaneously: Teacher, Social Studies Chair, and Oneida Teacher's Association President. He wore each of these hats confidently and fulfilled the associated roles very effectively. As the long time Social Studies Chair, Barry recruited talented faculty and encouraged their growth as instructors. As the Oneida Teachers' Association President, Barry represented his membership vigorously and tirelessly.

In contract negotiations, Barry was always strong in his advocacy, and always fair. We shared a mutual respect, often reinforced by humor, in the face of many challenges. Barry consistently performed the responsibilities attached to his three roles, with the aforementioned honesty and superior leadership." Former Superintendent Pete Tamburro added: "Barry was always a man of his word with great integrity. His follow through on any project or issue was impeccable. He was capable of seeing the big picture and both sides of any issue." Marc Reitz was the attorney for the school district and, as such, sat across the table from the OTA negotiators. Leo Maloney, who was on that team with Barry reported: "When we retired in 2003 Marc Reitz came to Oneida to wish us well and commented that although the negotiations were often tough, it was always about issues and matters of principle, never personal. Unlike many schools that he dealt with, the guiding principles were for the good of the organization -- not 'feathering the nest.' One year in allocating the pot of money that the District granted, there were only four people that did not receive the minimum percentage raise...three of those were on the negotiating team!"

When Barry was serious, he was all business: focused, dedicated, and determined. However, the man loved to have fun. Early in our careers in Oneida we were part of what eventually became known as the Curriculum Development Committee, which was basically going out for a few beers on Friday afternoons to blow off steam and celebrate the end of another week of school. We called it that so we could ask each other in the hall at school: "Are you going to the Curriculum Development Committee meeting this afternoon?" The kids must have thought we were really dedicated to be doing that on a Friday afternoon! Those who knew Barry socially are very familiar with his alter ego, Mildred Duck. One time another retired colleague, Kevin Roy, and I got in a serious discussion on Facebook about different breeds of migrating ducks. That was around 2010 when I lived over on Keuka Lake - mergansers, redheads, ringnecks, buffleheads. Hoping to add a little fun, Barry created the persona of Mildred Duck. He went and got a toy duck that one of his daughters had as a child and suddenly Mildred Duck was everywhere. Mildred Duck started

posting on his wife's Facebook page until she kicked him off and then Mildred got her own page! Mildred went to morning coffee at McDonald's with a group of retired colleagues called the Brain Trust. Mildred went on cruises, went to Ireland. Barry loved to see people's reactions to him carrying a blue, stuffed duck. He used it as a conversation starter. Often, he would ask people to pose for a photo with Mildred. Most agreed, but a few definitely did not. I remember one guy in an Irish pub saying to his friend: "That bloke's got a duck!" For those who knew Barry socially, he was a joy to be around.

Barry died this past March at the age of 78 after a months long battle with brain cancer. Teachers in the Oneida City School District today still benefit from the strengthening of the OTA that occurred during the years that he was President. Those of us who are now retired especially appreciate the work that he did on medical insurance, both before and after his retirement. In retirement, he served as the medical insurance expert for the Oneida Retired Educators Association. His time spent in our profession was time well spent, and both those of you who are still teaching and those of us who are retired benefit from that.




