# TALES FROM THE CRYPT

## Spring Edition

The Oneida Retired Educators Association (OREA) wants you to know we continue to be interested in the education of our children, the situations, rights and benefits of current and retired educators, and the state and federal legislation that affects us all.

We know that currently the OTA is working under a multi-year contract and does not face any crises that department at the present time. However, the next round of negotiations will be due to begin before you know it, and there is every reason to hope it will be a smooth process!

This column first ran in April of 2015, and although it's an oldie now, it's still a goodie. Give this bit of OTA history another read!

QUESTION: Has the OTA been involved with difficult contract negotiations in the past?

ANSWER: Yes.

Negotiations for the 1984-1985 school year contract had come to a standstill, and a Fact-Finder was employed to help the OTA (negotiating team: Tony Burnett, Angela Costello, Barry Zebley) and the District (Supt.: Joe Girardi) come to an agreement. Helen Beale was the NYSUT Field Rep. The contentious issues were Salary for teachers and nurses, Class Size, Dental Plan, Retirement Incentive, Tuition Reimbursement, and Agency Fee.

The idea of Agency Fee was being adopted by neighboring school districts, but was new to Oneida...about 90% of the teachers belonged to the OTA and paid dues, while the non-members still got all the benefits the OTA worked hard to secure. With Agency Fee, non-members would still be charged "union dues" whether or not they chose to join the union.

Class Size: At that time, many elementary classes numbered close to or over 30 students. For a few years, the district had not lowered class size, but did pay teachers whose classes were over the "impact number" \$250 extra per quarter, or gave the option of having a full-time classroom aide in lieu of compensation. The 4-6 grade number was 30...a few less for K-3. These numbers did not include the special education children who were not regularly assigned to the classrooms but were mainstreamed for much of the day. The OTA asked for those students to be counted and for the quarterly compensation to be increased.

Salary: In 1983-84, the starting teacher's salary for Oneida was \$13,096 and the starting school nurse's salary was \$7,290.

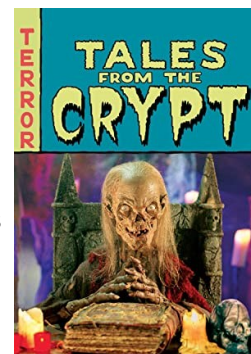
The Fact-Finder's report was presented on August 1, 1984. There was no movement. As the days of summer slipped away, talk of picketing and striking by the OTA began. OTA members were given a 5-page handout of Picketing Guidelines, covering legality, behavior, dealing with the press, etc. Members met in groups to prepare signs and discuss strategy. An OTA meeting was set for August 29th at the Knights of Columbus in Oneida. It was an emotional time as members wrestled with the typical questions...to protest or not. On September 3, an offer was presented to the OTA. Just before the first day of school, members received word that an agreement had been reached. There was an OTA meeting at the... (I remember it being at the Elk's Club, others think it was at the Knights again) and a fair, 2-year contract was accepted. School started as usual.

The starting teacher salary was raised to \$13,614, and starting nurse salary to \$7576. Coaching salaries were increased by 8.2% The class size compensation was increased to \$500 per quarter. There were improvements in insurance, and the retirement incentive was increased. Language concerning sick and personal leave was improved, and a few extra-curricular assignments were created or improved, e.g. additional yearbook advisor and bookstore supervisor. (I couldn't find in my research if Agency Fee was accepted.)

Now you know the story behind "the year we made the signs". Those signs became a symbol for the importance of the OTA...many of us kept them for years and years. Indeed, once in a while a student would search my drawer for some poster board for a project...pull one out, read it and say, "What the heck is this??" I would always look at that sign, remember that time, and think to myself, "THIS is what it means to be a proud member of the OTA." (All information taken from OTA files.)

I made the switch to OSMS in 1994 where I have remained. Many of my life events happened while in Oneida- marriage, the birth of two children as well as the loss of loved ones. It was the support of my colleagues that helped me through. Whether it was former art teachers coming out of retirement to sub for me, friends that came over to share my grief, or a welcome back decorated classroom filled with balloons to soften the blow, I thank you!

I have had the pleasure to make some amazing friendships and build connections with students and athletes who I am still in touch with today. It has been a privilege to have spent every day of my career teaching at OSMS. To be fair, it wasn’t such a bad ride. I taught a lot of really great kids and many of them have gone on to do really great things. True or not, I like to tell myself that I had some small hand in that.

I was fortunate to teach alongside some of the best people. They made sure I understood how lucky I was to teach in a teamed middle school and they taught me that teachers do far more than present content. I have done my best to represent them and pass their lessons on to the next generation of Oneida teachers.

Somehow, and usually against my will and better judgment, I advised clubs, participated on many committees, and served as a team leader and dean of students. Despite some inner turmoil, I grew into leadership positions that would have made my dad proud of me – as a building representative, Vice-President, and then President of the OTA during COVID.
