

A Message from our President - David Wright

Welcome to all returning and new staff. The new school year is well under way; hopefully, it has been a smooth start and things are going well. On September 14th we had the opportunity to welcome new members to the OTA. During the new member meeting we talk about many different topics that revolve around the benefits of belonging

to a union, health insurance, compensation and a stable schedule. One question that arose after our new member meeting that I would like to share some information on is tenure. What is it? When did it start? Below are a few summary points taken from NYSUT explanation of the tenure laws.

Tenure, simply put, is a safeguard that protects good teachers from unfair firing. Once a teacher is granted tenure — a right that must be earned after three years or more of service, oversight and evaluation — a teacher cannot be fired without a fair hearing. Tenure does not mean a job for life. It means simply that a teacher has the right to a fair hearing on charges that could end a career. This is a fundamental due process, an American value enshrined in our Bill of Rights.

Because tenure exists, teachers in New York state can speak out freely on issues such as over-testing, cuts in academic programs, inappropriate programs and services for students with disabilities. Tenure also provides teachers freedom to advocate for their students without fear of reprisal.

Teachers' unions do not negotiate tenure. The first tenure statute in New York state was enacted in 1897 — 70 years before public-sector unions had a right to bargain here — in recognition of society's deep interest in safeguarding its teachers from unfair firing and political pressure. Tenure ensures good teachers cannot be fired for reasons of race, gender, age, religion, handicapping condition or sexual orientation. Before tenure was in place, teachers could — and did — lose their jobs for arbitrary and politically motivated reasons, or for no reason at all.



# Back to School Edition

The members of the Oneida Retired Educators Association remind you that we are alive and well and still active on the educational scene in Oneida.

It should be a fun day, and retirees who haven't been in the schools for a while are sure to get an eyeful! I subbed for eight years after retiring in 2007,

I had a taste of the great tools teachers were using, but will be interested to see the latest.

I do have a personal connection to school technology right in my house. While cleaning a cupboard recently I found a sleeve of 12 boxes of good old white chalk. I was lucky to be in attendance one day when Oneida Castle School was being cleaned out prior to its closing, and scored the chalk for my grandkids' home chalkboards. (Omg, I hope this doesn't cause trouble with the OCSD Archives...nothing had been written with the chalk, it was just the chalk!) When I retired I was still using plenty of chalk, and had only had a few unpleasant experiences of using permanent markers on the whiteboards that had begun to appear. (Someone somewhere may still be learning that at 10:00 the sixth graders will be having Math.)

Many of the Oneida teachers actually were on the cutting edge of technology, and in the late '80s and '90s we used the newly acquired computers for amazing projects, taking the students beyond the stick-figure math games on those floppy disks in the computer bus. I involved my class in an email-based weather project called Kids as Global Scientists, which included gathering weather data and sharing it with other classes worldwide. Each morning I would stop at OHS and get Earth Science teacher Tom Donegan's floppy disk from his weather station and use it as the basis for the day's activities. After inserting the disk, pressing a few buttons, extracting it and reinserting it on the other side, the students would record the data and get started. Good grief!! It was a great project...at the urging of Media Director Barb Stahl and with the help of ace student Randy Carnevale, we entered our work in the WCNY "Using Technology in the Classroom" contest and won first place!

As we look forward to getting a look at some of the latest hardware and software in the schools, it's important to remember the importance of teachers standing together to obtain the best materials and equipment for the benefit of the students. While it may be a stretch to claim that the OTA is responsible for all the equipment teachers have at their fingertips today, it is valid to point out that in the '70s the schools were not equal. Some schools allotted teachers \$50 a year for a budget, barely enough to buy those sleeves of white chalk and a few packs of construction paper, while others were told to order everything they wanted. With the development of the OTA and the knowledge that the teachers were standing together, the buildings became more equal. That's just one more reason to always remember the importance of the OTA.

Here is the lastest news from New York State Teachers' Retirement System. Any questions, reach out to our NYSTRS representative John Zamperetti (jzamperetti@oneidacsd.org)

- Vesting for Tier 5 and 6 members has been reduced from 10 years of service credit down to five years of service credit.
- Tier 6 contribution rate is changing. The first three years are total compensation, the next two years are based on annual base wages only, not including extracurricular programs.
- Finally, the suspension of the \$35,000 cap restriction has been extended for retirees working in public schools through the end of this school year (and probably future years as well).
