A message from the President

As you know, we once again returned to the school year without a successor agreement in place. This marks the second contract in a row where the OTA and the District have failed to reach a settlement. Two contracts ago, the first with the current administration; a settlement was reached in late August. Previous to this administration, negotiations were very amicable and Oneida had never gone



back in September without a successor agreement in place. For the second consecutive time, impasse was declared, and we will enter into mediation. Two sessions are currently scheduled; the first on October 15, the second on November 3. Until a successor agreement is reached, the terms and conditions of the current contract remain in place.

It's fortunate that our contract remains in place as we continue to work toward an agreement. The provision that allows this is the Triborough Amendment to the Taylor Law. Without this, we would be forced to start from scratch each time a contract expires. This, along with other important laws, is under constant attack from outside groups. Tenure, APPR, length of year, and insurance coverage are easy targets for an uninformed public who see those in our profession as underworked and overpaid dependents who survive on taxpayers' dollars. Governor Cuomo has recently stated that the teacher rating system needs to be "refined." He seems to agree with those who question how 94% of teachers can be "effective or highly effective." He is just one politician who seems to

consistently attack teachers and our profession. To help combat that, we must seek out those who support us. VOTE/COPE serves as NYSUT's political action arm. Money collected through V/C is used to support groups who protect and serve in our best interests. While some find the thought of "lobbying" distasteful, it has become a necessary tool. Without people fighting for us, significant losses could occur in areas of tenure, retirement, and teacher evaluation. 
