In keeping with our mission of reminding everyone of the importance of a strong union for both active and retired teachers, Terri Phillips, Retired, OSMS, submitted the following:

"I belong to an on-line group of teachers from all over the US and Canada, and lately I've been hearing some pretty scary stories. One teacher from Wisconsin said that she was losing her job because the principal wanted to hire his niece. Others have asked for advice wondering how they were going to manage the eight different preps they found they had been assigned when they came back to school. Some talked about being required to chaperone at athletic events on the weekends. They neither volunteered for this nor were they being paid for it. Still another was written up for giving a student detention and was not even allowed to tell her side of what happened.

An even worse story came from a teacher in Texas. She was ordered by her superintendent to take her science class and paint the bathrooms in the football stadium before Homecoming the next week. When she questioned how this could possibly relate to her science class she was told, "It doesn't matter because science is not that important... and don't forget to scrub the walls first, as they are covered in pee." !!!!! And guess what...they don't have a union.

All of this made me really appreciative of the fact that throughout most of my career NYSUT was there to prevent these types of outrageous behaviors. As a new teacher I remember wondering why on earth we needed a union. I know now how naive I was and am very grateful that I taught in New York State with a strong teacher's union behind me."
